NEW LEGISLATIONS IN AUGUST:

House members introduced a total of 30 pieces of legislation in August. There were 12 Bills and 18 resolutions. Members of the Senate introduced a total of 12. They were one bill and eleven resolutions.

Not one of the 42 bills and resolutions was for the veterans or military in Ohio.

With only two months left before the November midterm election, our legislators as a whole are not spending too much energy on the business of the current General Assembly. Most of them are thinking about what they will be doing when this General Assembly ends. Some are hoping to keep the seat they now have while others are looking for something new.

And that is also what the voting citizens of Ohio should be thinking about. Because what they do at the polls will determine who will be representing them for the next two or four years. What the elected legislators do during those years will have a big effect on the lives of Ohioans for many years to come.

With no hearings to report on and no voting sessions being held there are no August *Happenings* for us to talk about. What seems to be most important right now is the midterm election coming up in two months.

First thing to remember is that every voter should check their registration on the Secretary of State website and make sure everything is up to date and correct. Readers can also check to see what ID will be accepted at the polls. The deadline to register is Monday, October 5.

Early voting will begin on Tuesday, October 6 and for those who want an absentee ballot, the application must be received at the board of elections by the close of business on Wednesday, October 28.

While being prepared to vote is very important, preparing to vote intelligently is just as important. Who will be on the ballot and what issues will be seen is the first thing to learn. The next step is to learn everything you can about those candidates and issues.

Our long-time readers



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know that OL Report will not tell anyone what party or individual should get their vote. Everyone is looking for something different in their life and what we want will not be the same thing our readers want. Every individual needs to make the decision of who to vote for themselves.

OL Report believes in voting for the best candidates. Ones that will accomplish what the voter wants to have done. We do not recommend voting a straight ticket. We firmly believe in learning everything possible about the past, present, and future of every candidate and vote for the one that is the most likely to do the work each voter hopes for.

Let's look at what the voters of Ohio will be seeing on ballots in this election. There will only be one statewide issue and that will be Issue #3. It will ask each voter if the Ohio Constitution should be amended to include the following language...

Section 5. (A) Electors shall provide photo identification in order to vote in person at a polling place or other voting location designated by law, in accordance with laws passed by the general assembly, except that the laws may provide an alternative method of verifying the identity of an elector who does not have photo identification because the elector has a sincere religious objection to being photographed.

(B) At a minimum, and in accordance with laws

passed by the general assembly, electors shall provide photo identification or, if authorized by law, a signature and at least one other unique identifier in order to vote by any other method authorized by law.

(C) As used in this section:

(1) "Photo identification" means one of the following documents that is issued by an agency of this state or the United States, includes the elector's name and photograph, and is not expired:

(a) A driver's license or state identification card issued by the Ohio bureau of motor vehicles or its successor agency or a temporary document issued by that

A look at what the bills say... ***In a Nutshell***

Summaries from the OFFICE OF RESEARCH AND DRAFTING

Bills get classified as a veteran/military bill due to the effect it will have on our Ohio veterans and military members. Just because a bill does not have the words 'veteran' or 'military' in them does not mean they are not important to veterans or military members.

We have several such bills in the legislation listed at the end of every issue of OL Report. Look them over. Can you find them?

In this issue we will cover one such bill. House Bill 279. It was introduced back in May 2025 and has had only two hearings while in the House Ways and Means Committee. It was introduced by Representatives **Adam Mathews** (HD-56) and **Josh Williams** (HD-44).

House Bill 279-

The Summary & Analysis

As Introduced

SUMMARY

- Authorizes a nonrefundable income tax credit for 30%, up to \$2,000, of certain expenses incurred by family caregivers with income below a certain threshold to care for a family member above the age of 49.

DETAILED ANALYSIS

Income tax credit for family caregivers

The bill creates a nonrefundable income tax credit for an eligible taxpayer that incurs certain eligible expenses to act as a caregiver for a family member above the age of 49. The amount of the credit is 30% of eligible caregiving expenses, up to a maximum credit of \$2,000 per caregiver per year. If a taxpayer qualifies for the credit but cannot claim it in its entirety because it is greater than the taxpayer's liability, the taxpayer may carry the unclaimed portion forward indefinitely.

This credit is available for taxable years ending on or after the bill's 90-day effective date.

The Tax Commissioner may adopt rules as necessary to administer the credit.

Eligible taxpayers and family members

To qualify for the credit, a taxpayer's adjusted gross income must be above \$7,500, exclusive of interest, dividends, royalties, rent, and capital gains. Also, spouses filing a joint return must have a modified

adjusted gross income (MAGI) of less than \$94,000. (MAGI is state taxable income, without deduction for capital gains and business income.) A spouse filing a separate return is limited to a MAGI of \$56,500, and all other taxpayers have a MAGI limit of \$69,000. In addition to the income conditions, the taxpayer must have incurred at least \$1,000 in expenses to take care of a family member who has a documented need, certified by a licensed health care provider, for assistance with at least two activities of daily living, such as ambulating, eating, dressing, and hygiene.

An eligible family member is someone above the age of 49 as of the last day of the taxable year who is related to the taxpayer by blood or marriage. The bill allows more than one taxpayer to qualify for the credit based on expenses associated with caring for the same eligible family member, but not on the basis of the same expenses.

Eligible expenses

Credit-eligible expenses are out-of-pocket expenses incurred during the taxable year that are directly related to caring for the eligible family member and that have not been reimbursed or otherwise covered by another person, organization, or government entity. They include mobility or safety improvements made to a primary residence or motor vehicle; equipment or assistive technology purchased or leased to assist with activities of daily living; respite care, adult day care, or hiring a home care aide or other direct care worker; and other expenses such as transportation costs or legal and financial services. General household maintenance expenses, however, such as expenses related to painting, plumbing, electrical repairs, or exterior maintenance, do not qualify for the credit.

agency to an applicant for a driver's license or state identification card that contains all of the information otherwise found on the license or card and that the applicant may use as a form of identification while waiting to receive the license or card;

(b) A United States passport or passport card;

(c) A United States military identification card, an Ohio national guard identification card, or an identification card issued by the United States department of veterans affairs or its successor agency.

(2) "Other unique identifier" means one of the following that is authorized by the general assembly by law for voting purposes:

(a) A unique numeric or alphanumeric descriptor assigned to the elector by an agency of this state or the United States;

(b) A truncated version of a descriptor described in division (C)(2)(a) of this section.

What needs to be foremost in every voter's mind is that this issue is not to decide if Ohio will require voter ID. It is to decide if the current law should be made a prelate part of the Ohio Constitution instead of the Ohio Revised Code.

What else will be on the ballots? A lot of names. They are the candidates running for local, county, and state offices. The only ones we are going to discuss are the ones running for an open seat in the 137th Ohio General Assembly. But we are not going to talk about the individuals, themselves.

What we are going to do is take a look at the makeup of this election and how the 137th G.A. might be different from the 136th G.A.

But first let's understand how the system works. Everyone should know that there are two chambers (two houses) in the Ohio General Assembly and they are the House of Representatives and the Senate. The members of the House serve two-year terms and the members of the Senate serve four-year terms. The House has 99 districts (seats) and the Senate has 33.

Members of the House are limited to four successive two-year terms. Elections for all 99 are held in November of every even-numbered year and the term begins on January 1 of each odd-numbered year following the election.

In the Senate approximately one half of the members are elected every other election. The senators in odd-numbered districts are all elected at the same time and the ones in even-numbered districts are in the election two years later.

When members become ineligible for reelection under term limits, they only become eligible for election to the same office again after a four-year absence from the office. That is why you will see

representatives who are term-limited run for a seat in the Senate or a term-limited senator run for a seat in the House. More than one member has been successful at serving in the General Assembly for ten or more years by jumping back and forth between the House and Senate.

This November there are 17 Senate seats up for election (the odd-numbered districts). Five candidates are currently serving in the House and nine are incumbents. Three of the 17 seats are a 3-way race –there are three candidates running for each seat. One seat has only one candidate and while they are not an incumbent, they did serve in the House previously (2017-2022). There are a total of 35 candidates vying for the 17 seats.

In the House all 99 seats are up for election and there are 203 individuals campaigning for them. There are 79 incumbents. Seven seats only have one candidate, but there are 14 that have three candidates. There are two candidates who are not incumbents but have served in the House before. Two other candidates served previously in the Ohio House as well as in Congress. One is an incumbent. The other is not.

There are a total of 238 candidates asking for your vote and there are only 116 seats. Those 238 break down as follows: 113 democrats, 109 republicans, 8 libertarians, and 8 independents.

A bill is a document by which a member of the General Assembly proposes to enact a new law or amend or repeal an existing law. The term "bill" is used to refer to the document from the time it is drafted and delivered to the members until it is considered and approved by both the House and the Senate. After passing both houses, a bill becomes an "act" and must be presented to the Governor for acceptance or rejection. If accepted, or if the Governor does not take any action for ten days, it becomes a "law."
